LOVE LEAVES EVIDENCE

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I spent nearly four decades as a private investigator. I learned early on that what people said happened and what the evidence actually revealed were not always the same. So when someone asks me to prove God's existence, my investigator's instinct kicks in, and I find myself returning to one particular piece of evidence: love.

Not sentimental love. Not greeting card love. I mean the kind of love that causes human beings to place another person's well-being alongside or ahead of their own.

I have seen a husband choose confession over deception because he could no longer bear what his choices were doing to his family. I have seen marriages that appeared headed toward destruction find their way back when someone stopped asking, "Whose fault is this?" and began asking, "What can I do now?"

And I learned one of my greatest lessons about love from my three-year-old son, Jeremy. Years ago, Jeremy heard me say that I wasn't going to be living at home anymore because Mommy and Daddy weren't getting along. He immediately started sobbing. Something about those tears stopped me. I held my little boy and realized that all my explanations meant very little to a three-year-old. A child measures love in presence.

In that moment, I say with God's help, I changed the way I understood fatherhood. And perhaps it changed the way I understand God. Because throughout my life, I have noticed something peculiar about love. When we practice it, we expand. When we withhold it, something inside us contracts.

Forgiveness can restore relationships that logic says should remain broken. Compassion can cross boundaries that politics, nationality, race, and religion cannot. A parent's attention can change a child's trajectory. One person's willingness to take responsibility can interrupt generations of blame.

Why? I cannot put God underneath a microscope, but as an investigator, I know that we regularly conclude something exists without seeing it directly. We recognize it by what it produces. We cannot see gravity. We see what gravity does. We cannot see another person's love. We see the evidence it leaves behind.

Perhaps God works similarly. Maybe the real question isn't, "Can I prove God exists?" but, "What happens to human beings when we live as though love is sacred?"

After decades of investigating people—and now helping men repair relationships with their wives and children—I keep discovering the same clue. Love asks us to become bigger than our fear. It invites responsibility instead of blame, forgiveness instead of vengeance, curiosity instead of judgment, and contribution instead of self-absorption. And when we answer that invitation, something extraordinary often happens. People come home to one another.

I cannot hand you God's fingerprints, but I can show you the results that love leaves on people's lives. Perhaps God isn't hiding from us after all. Perhaps we have just been looking in the wrong places. Love leaves evidence. And after a lifetime of thoroughly investigating the data, I find that important clue extremely difficult to ignore.
